"FREE LOT" SCHEMES OPERATING IN STATE

(By Portland Better Business Bureau, Inc.) "Winning a lot may mean losing a lot," says a warning issued today by the Portland Better Business Bureau, "especially when the building lot have wide lot in a narrow, 20-foot wide lot in an undeveloped subdivision."

The bureau report indicates that these "free lot" rackets have recently become active again in Oregon and states that promotions of this character have been investigated in the past and it has been ascertained that there is always some catch to the supposedly free offer.

According to the report, promoters usually obtain the names of prospects by handing out cards at large public gatherings, advertising, of course, that a drawing is to be held and prizes offered. Ordinarily all who turn in cards are notified that they have "won," but when they visit the property they find that the lot they have been awarded is only 18 or 20 feet wide and is in an undesirable location in the subdivision. When the winner indicates that he is not satisfied with the lot the salesman offers to trade him a lot in the "restricted district." This second piece of property will probably be found to be more satisfactory, but it is then explained by the promoter that because of restrictions it is impossible to let anyone have a lot in that district less than fifty feet wide, so it is necessary for the "winner" to buy an additional 25 feet of property for from \$300 to \$500 in order to secure his "prize."

When the victim realizes what has happened he finds that he has paid a substantial price for a piece of property he probably would not have purchased under ordinary circumstances.

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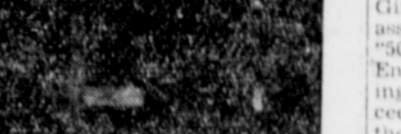
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
