WORTHLESS NEWS CLIPPINGS BEING OFFERED OREGONIANS

(By Portland Better Business Bureau, Inc.) The Portland Better Business Bureau reports that several so-called "home clipping bureaus" are sending postal cards to various people throughout the state, reading something like this:

"We have a clipping where you are specifically mentioned which may interest you. Please return this notice, along with stamped addressed return envelope and fifty cents to cover expense and clipping will be sent you promptly."

These home clipping bureaus, sending out such notices spring out periodically in various parts of the country, and almost invariably their existence is of brief duration, for the so-called service they offer is of negligible value the bureau states. Briefly, these bureaus operate in this manner: They secure newspapers from numerous towns and cities, usually from points in other states, and clip all articles of any nature, in which a name and address appear. To these people they send a card similar to the one quoted.

Ordinarily, those responding to these cards are under the impression they will receive an article which appeared in a paper in the city in which the clipping bureau operates, but find, upon receipt of the clipping, that it is some minor mention in their home town paper and of little interest or value. Some of these so-called clipping bureaus clip any sort of notice, legal or otherwise, in which a name and address appear. Not infrequently these operations have been fraudulent in character, with the operators making little, if any, effort to send any type of clipping in exchange for the fee.
