where an onion crop is to be grown, will be of any benefit. These beaverdam soils are usually sour and to completely cure that acid condition would require a quantity of lime the cost of which would be prohibitive. Onions are not affected by a sour soil and from data available there is no indication that the use of the limestone will increase the effectiveness of other fertilizers used.

Landplaster is quite generally used on red clover and alfalfa in this county. There are some cases where it is used on vetch and peas. Its use on these two latter crops is not always a good thing. In any case where vetch either for seed or hay is pastured, an application of landplaster is almost certain to be an advantage. Where vetch and peas are planted on soils of high fertility and if growing conditions have been satisfactory, the use of landplaster is likely to be of very little importance, and in some cases its use may be a detriment as it may cause excessive growing and consequent excessive lodging. In fact, vetch and these things usually occur at the expense of seed setting. On land that is comparatively low in fertility, the use of landplaster is of considerable value. Whether or not it is to be used on peas and vetch is a specific individual farm problem. The vetch and pea seed grower should size up the situation and from his experience of crop yields on the same land together with a consideration of seasonal conditions determine if landplastering will be of benefit to his crop.
