Herd Association Re-Elects Officers at Annual Meeting

All officers of the Washington county herd improvement association were re-elected at the annual meeting held in January at the county court house in Hillsboro. Several new rules were adopted, according to the monthly report of Jake Lehrenz, tester.

The January report shows that nine cows were found to be boarded and were sold for beef; one cow was sold for dairy purposes and eight cows reacted to the mastitis test and were sold for beef.

There were 27 herds on test with 639 cows enrolled of which 98 were dry. Total production of milk for the period was 431 pounds with 1855 pounds of fat. There were 191 cows in the class averaging 40 pounds of fat. Average production for all cows was 695.8 of milk and 31.07 pounds of fat.

Two high cows for the month are owned by David Hagg & Sons of Reedville. Spot 2, four-year-old

grade Jersey, produced 1615 pounds of milk and 98.5 of fat while Watt 2, six-year-old grade Jersey produced 1289 pounds of milk and 93.3 of fat.

High in the county for herds of 20 to 40 cows was the Mrs. Tom Williams herd of purebred Jerseys numbering 21, which averaged 606 pounds of milk and 37.71 of fat.

High in herds of 12 to 20 cows was that of J. W. Mulloy of Laurel with 19 purebred and grade Guernseys, which averaged 973 pounds of milk and 43.93 of fat.

Chris Reichen's herd of 10 grade Jerseys and Holsteins was high in herds of under 12 cows with 1055 pounds of milk and 43.02 pounds of fat.

The herd of grade Jerseys owned by David Hagg & Sons with 33 cows, was high for herds of more than 40. The average milk production was 680 pounds with a fat average of 38.48.
