Two petitions, one to the city council protesting the use of "pin-ball" games by minors and asking that licenses for their use be revoked, and the other to Sheriff John W. Conroy asking for more rigid enforcement of the law prohibiting the sale of tobacco to minors, were passed by the Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association, meeting Monday night in the union high school.
