Industrial property must pay at the rate of two cents per 100 cubic feet of sewage matter dumped into the sewers. Measure will be by

With the exception of industrial rentals, all rentals are due and payable on or before January 1 in advance except for the remainder of 1936, the amount to be determined by the proportion of the year still remaining after the sewers have been accepted as completed Industrial plants must pay on the tenth of each month for the preceding month. Delinquent pay ments will bear interest at 6 per

To equalize benefits between the property immediately connected to the sewers and that which will be connected later, the ordinance provides that there shall be no charge within 60 days of the time the sewer is completed and accepted. After that, \$2 will be charged until December 31, 1937, with \$1 a 70 people.
