Ordinances Pass Fixing Sewer Rate

additional for each opening over the minimum of six. Business property carries a minimum of \$18 a year for the six openings with \$1.50 additional for each additional opening.

Industrial property must pay at the rate of two cents per 100 cubic feet of sewage matter dumped into the sewers. Measure will be by meter.

With the exception of industrial rentals, all rentals are due and payable on or before January 1 in advance except for the remainder of 1936, the amount to be determined by the proportion of the year still remaining after the sewers have been accepted as completed.

Industrial plants must pay on the tenth of each month for the preceding month. Delinquent payments will bear interest at 6 per cent.

To equalize benefits between the property immediately connected to the sewers and that which will be connected later, the ordinance provides that there shall be no charge within 60 days of the time the sewer is completed and accepted.

After that, \$2 will be charged until December 31, 1937, with \$1 a year added each year thereafter until the connection charge amounts to \$12 in the old district.

In the new district the same rule will be followed except that \$5 will be added each year until the total connection charge has reached \$52.

In providing a penalty for delinquent payments, the ordinance states that on March 1 each year, a list shall be prepared by the city auditor of all property having unpaid rentals and that the council shall then proceed to assess a levy against the property in single

Groner to Make Test on Folks Berry Taste
