Washington county farms it is becoming increasingly difficult to provide pasture. The dairy committee estimated that it would require approximately one hour a day for dairymen to cut green feed required for one day's feeding for a 10-cow herd.

Generally throughout Washington county lime should be applied to the land before seeding alfalfa. This can be put on any time up to almost the time the alfalfa is seeded. When it is put on late in the season, the crop will, of course, receive no benefit from it the first year, but since the alfalfa does nothing much more than get started the first year, this will not matter particularly. Seeding the alfalfa and then liming it afterwards has not proven very effective in sweetening the soil. The lime should be worked in which means it should be put on after the ground is plowed. If the alfalfa is to get a good start, it is essential that the ground be in good shape to hold moisture and this means that it must be finely pulverized and well-packed. This can be done on spring plowing, but fall or winter plowing in preparation for planting alfalfa has proven more satisfactory. From time to time various fields of alfalfa in Washington county have been planted where part of the plantings would be on fall-plowed ground and another part of it on early spring or even late winter-plowed ground all in the same field. Almost without exception the alfalfa will make the better growth the first year where given a more vigorous start on the fall-plowed ground.

That there are differences in the strains of alfalfa seed has been very clearly demonstrated in demonstration plantings on several places in the county using several strains in each planting. Growers have inquired from time to time about alfalfa for the Willamette valley. This is a variety that has done fine in Eastern Oregon, but under Willamette valley conditions it generally does not prove as satisfactory as the Grimm variety. It seems to be more or less of a one-crop strain. That is, it doesn't come back quite as well as the Grimm does under the same conditions. For Washington county conditions growers can do well to plant nothing but a certified strain of the Grimm variety.

Gophers ruin many an alfalfa stand. These can be effectively controlled through a consistent use of poisoned bait made up by using powdered strychnine on green clover tops or during the winter season by using carrots or parsnips as bait.

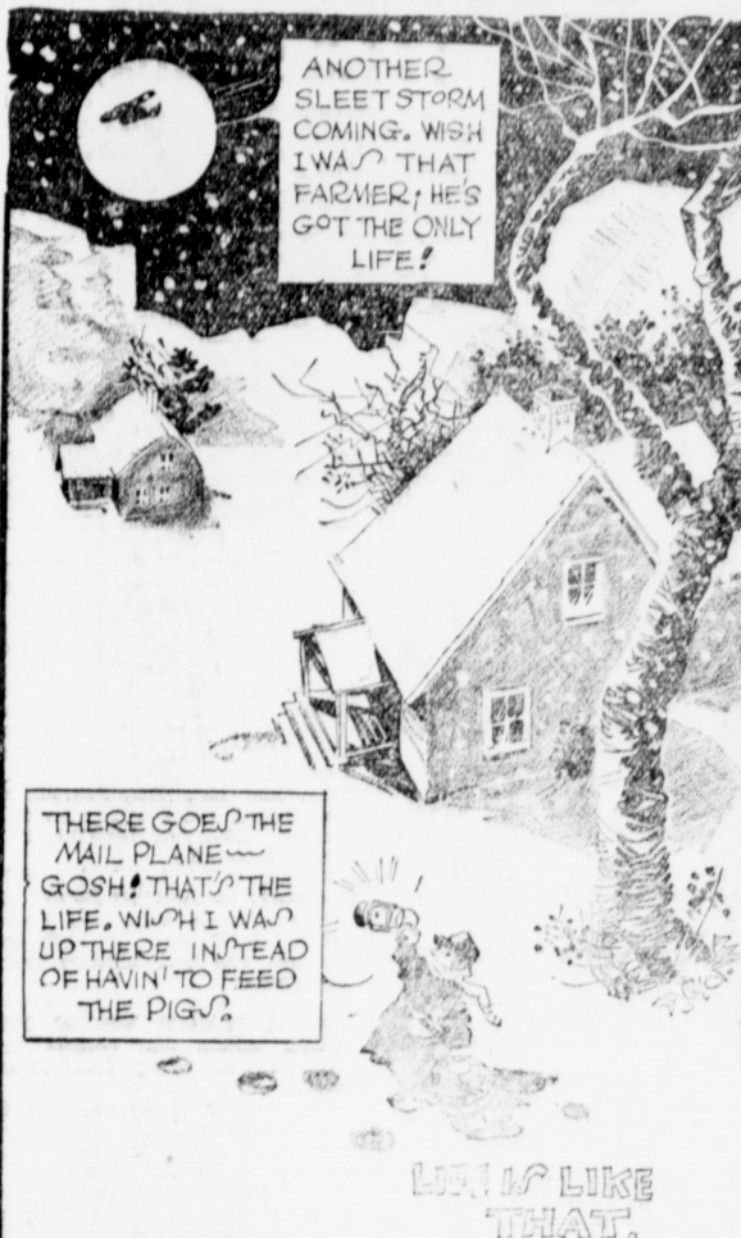
