Nation Turns Again to Washington's Leadership on Constitutional Issues

THE vision that was George Washington's lights the course of American government with a new brilliance on the 204th anniversary of his birth.

At a time in our history when grave constitutional issues once more arise to demand decisions, the political acumen and forethought of the country's first president stand out as cheering

"The Constitution that is submitted," wrote Washington to a friend in 1787, "is not free from imperfections: but there are as few radical defects in it as could well be expected, considering the heterogeneous mass of which the convention was composed on the diversity of interests which were to be reconciled.

"A constitutional door being opened, for future alterations and amendments, I think it would be wise in the people to adopt what is offered them."

THUS Washington pointed out -two years before adoption of the great document-the utter impossibility of framing a law fundamentally broad enough never to be changed. The door is open for what the future may require, he said in effect. And today, as many times be-

fore in our history, we are considering constitutional changes to meet the tempo of the times. Speaking to the nation Sept.

17, 1796, as he prepared for retirement, Washington said em-

"The basis of our political systems is the right of the people to make and alter their constitutions of government."

Then he added the equally vital

"But the Constitution which at any time exists, till changed by an explicit and authentic act of the whole people, is sacredly obligatory upon all. The very idea of the power and the right of the people to establish government presupposes the duty of every individual to obey the established




