

Knights Celebrate 72nd Anniversary

Highway Landscape Engineer Speaker

"Preserving our Heritage—Scenic Oregon—is the guiding thought of the present highway commission," reported George Otten, landscape engineer for the commission, when he was the speaker at the Garden club meeting Monday evening. "When the locating crew is laying out a new piece of construction our department makes suggestions which preserve the natural beauty of the landscape or makes available beauty spots in the location. These are done without destroying the utilitarian purpose of the road."

"In western and mountainous parts of Oregon open views are much better than cramped sights caused by avenue planting along the right of way. In the more arid part of the state the commission, which is also the park commission, has arranged oases at intervals where one can either rest the eyes alone or remain awhile."

"Interested persons are awaiting the outcome of legal ruling on the California strip zoning law, which gives the highway board authority over roadside advertising within a certain number of feet of the roads. If this bill is upheld then Oregon will need the help of all beauty-lovers to secure a like measure."

"The coast highway bridges have been landscaped and when the bridges are completed the settings will show off the bridges to very good advantage."

Mr. Otten showed designs of some of the work underway and plans for several spots along Canyon road.

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
