Kent sails March 4 from San Francisco for New Zealand and Australia, where he will be on a wrestling tour for the next six months, with possibly a trip to China after that.

Twelve grapplers, two each on every boat for the next six weeks, are making the trip, and Kent captains the team. His appearance at the auditorium tonight against Wee Willie Davis will be his last night before he sails in this county for many a month.

Harry is taking Mrs. Kent to the Antipodes with him. She also was with him on his recent trip east (his first) on which Harry in 47 bouts won 37, drew nine and lost only two. One of his defeats was to Don George, the other to Hans Steinkie.

closing time of the contest. Announcement of the final winner will be withheld until the Argus is issued next Thursday morning.

Contestants are asked to pay strict attention to the following rules governing the closing days of the contest so that none will be disappointed:

Contestants will keep close track of vote totals published and report discrepancies between the official count and their own totals. Unless errors are reported by 6 p. m. Saturday, the count posted in the window of the Argus Friday night will be considered correct up to that time. No changes will be made in such totals after that date.

Contestants are asked to segregate the ballots of the three denominations and to gather each kind in bundles of 50 ballots each. This will materially facilitate counting the large volume of last-minute votes anticipated and eliminate possibility of errors.

In addition to the two first

prizes, several other prizes have been offered in the contest. Second place winner in each of the two contests will receive \$25 each and the third place winners \$10 each. A \$5 prize has been offered to the girl, who has less than 15-000 votes on February 12, who makes the greatest progress during the balance of the competition. All of these awards will be in the form of merchandise orders to be honored in whole or in part by any of the participating merchants.

A special \$10 cash prize will be given the contestant, regardless of the contest in which she is competing, who obtains the greatest number of new or renewal yearly subscriptions in Washington county to the Hillsboro Argus. Contestants will also receive votes for cash said on subscriptions placed to their credit. Subscription contest dates are from February 21 to March 2, inclusive.
