This Bible is of the Geneva Version which appears in several editions during the years 1557-60. It was the first complete English Bible to be divided into verses, and the first one to be printed in Roman type. It is also known as the "Breeches Bible," because in Genesis 3:7 the translation reads:

After April 15 the delinquent taxpayer still has the opportunity of paying one-quarter of the oldest year's delinquent taxes without paying interest penalty providing that the current 1936 taxes are paid in full.

FOR EXAMPLE—If 1931 are oldest delinquent taxes, waiver of the interest penalty can be secured by payment of the current 1936 taxes and not less than one-quarter of the 1931 taxes. This process of retirement can be spread over a period of years by payment of current taxes each year before same are delinquent and one-quarter of the oldest year of delinquent taxes.
