The all-day meeting is scheduled to begin at 10:30 a. m. in the chamber of commerce rooms. Mrs. Ella M. Cypher, North Plains, chairman of the county home economics committee, will preside. The morning session will be devoted to a discussion of curtains for the home.

Group singing will start the afternoon session. The group singing will be in charge of Mrs. G. Hite, song leader of the Sherwood extension unit, and Mrs. D. Chamberlain, song leader of the North Plains extension unit. Miss Patterson will speak during the afternoon, on housecleaning short.

Women coming from out of town will make their own luncheon arrangements. The meeting is free and all of the townswomen as well as rural women are invited to attend.

The Treferns own a home here, consisting of 10 acres on which they have built a cottage, barn, etc., and have several acres of youngberries and walnuts, which are being cared for the present tenants, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Meyers, formerly of Bonneville.

The story said in part: "Among the men the minister always is referred to as a 'regular guy.' One man's words: 'He isn't a preachy preacher—that's why I like him,' carry a vivid description and disclose the character of the man who is doing his best to instill in his fellowmen an awareness of life higher than the material. Although slight in build, the little minister has a forceful, friendly personality and a straight-from-the-shoulder way of talking that appeals to men."

"Mr. Trefern on June 3, 1934, preached his first sermon at Bonneville. His appointment was approved, and on July 1, with his wife and small daughter, he moved to his new home.

"Congregations at first numbered only about 15, but today from 40 to 60 people attend services each Sunday.
