his candidacy Graham released the following statement:

"Considering the fact that the incumbent, Edw. C. Luce, has declined to be a candidate for re-election to the office of county clerk of Washington county, and feeling that my legal education and experience as a practicing attorney in Washington county particularly qualifies me to hold the office of county clerk, I have concluded to submit my name to the voters of Washington county for nomination to the office of county clerk on the republican ballot.

The only platform upon which a candidate for the office of county clerk can subscribe is one of honest, efficient and impartial service to the people of Washington county. The work of the clerk's office is highly technical and demands a knowledge of law for its successful operation, and in this respect I could best serve the people of Washington county by maintaining the high standard of efficiency set by Mr. Luce during his terms of office."

Last week Robert Kelly of Hillsboro filed as a candidate for nomination on the republican ticket.

Oscar M. Taylor of Hazeldale filed Saturday for the republican nomination for county commissioner. He would succeed James Lewis, present commissioner, whose term expires this year. Taylor, a resident of Washington county for 56 years, was road foreman for 12 years, starting with Engineer Charles D. Jones. He was a candidate for the republican nomination in 1930 and 1934. Taylor was born in Portland in 1875.

Lewis has not yet made public announcement, but it is understood that he intends entering the field for re-election.

John Connell, sheriff, still stands alone in the field for sheriff. Up to date rumor has not connected any other name with this office.

Filings for the office of district attorney still remain a blank, although G. Russell Morgan is expected to file.

Henry Atlee, who became Banks postmaster Saturday, resigned as a state democratic committeeman at the democratic conclave in the chamber of commerce rooms Friday night. He was succeeded by John Bernards of Roy. Possible candidates for county office were considered.

Senator George Aitken of Garden Home announced at the democratic meeting that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

E. L. Ross, state representative, is expected to file next week for state senator on the democratic ticket from this county. Asked Wednesday if the report was true, Ross said that he would make a statement next week.

Another contestant in the democratic ranks is expected to be Bert Hagen, Tigard real estate man, who will seek the nomination for county commissioner.
