call to either road job, or any other WPA project in the county. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce Monday noon:

"Whereas, we have dreamed, for so many years, of two short roads, broad federal highways connecting the prosperous farms of the Tualatin plains, the cities and towns, and the metropolis of Oregon with the dairy industry, cities and beach resorts along the Pacific ocean and;

"Whereas, from time immemorial this Chamber of Commerce has labored industriously to bring about the advent and completion of said highways, and has at all times joined with other civic bodies in every honest effort to get the roads constructed, but has continually met with governor's vetoes, and opposition, and defeat until it has seemed at times as though we were confronting an impossible task; and the quiet solitude of the forests, the roar of the cascades, and the grandeur of the scenery along the way has only been disturbed by the fall of the cataraacts, the call of the buck deer and the growl of the bear; and as the years have passed the bark on the giant fir and cedar has become thicker, and the moss hanging from their branches has grown longer, and despair and doubt has constantly filled the minds and hearts of more than 300,000 citizens of the northwest in our beloved state; and;

"Whereas, we have appealed in person, by telephone, by telegram, and by resolution to the Honorable Charles L. McNary to become our Moses, and lead us out of the wilderness of despair; and;

"Whereas, he has joined with those who have consistently been active in attempting to accomplish PWA projects to give the unemployed work in clearing and constructing these roads, resulting finally in the accomplishment of the purpose, and the assurance that warrants have been signed and executed providing the necessary funds for immediate work for the unemployed, and the clearing and grading of rights of way on these roads; and;

"Whereas, we desire to show our appreciation for the work well done; and to acknowledge a debt of gratitude;

"Now Therefore, be it resolved that the chamber of commerce of Forest Grove appreciates the co-operation and assistance given, and say "Thank you, Mr. McNary," and;

"Be it further resolved that the secretary of the chamber of commerce is hereby instructed to send to Mr. McNary a copy of this resolution, and to forward a copy of the same to the following newspapers: News Times, Forest Grove; The Herald, Tillamook; The Argus, Hillsboro; The Oregonian and Journal at Portland."

The Forest Grove chamber also passed a resolution thanking L. M. Graham, head of their highway committee, for his years of effort in behalf of the short cut sea roads.
