Earl Anderson returned last week from a visit to Garibaldi. Mrs. John Rook is visiting relatives in Willamina.

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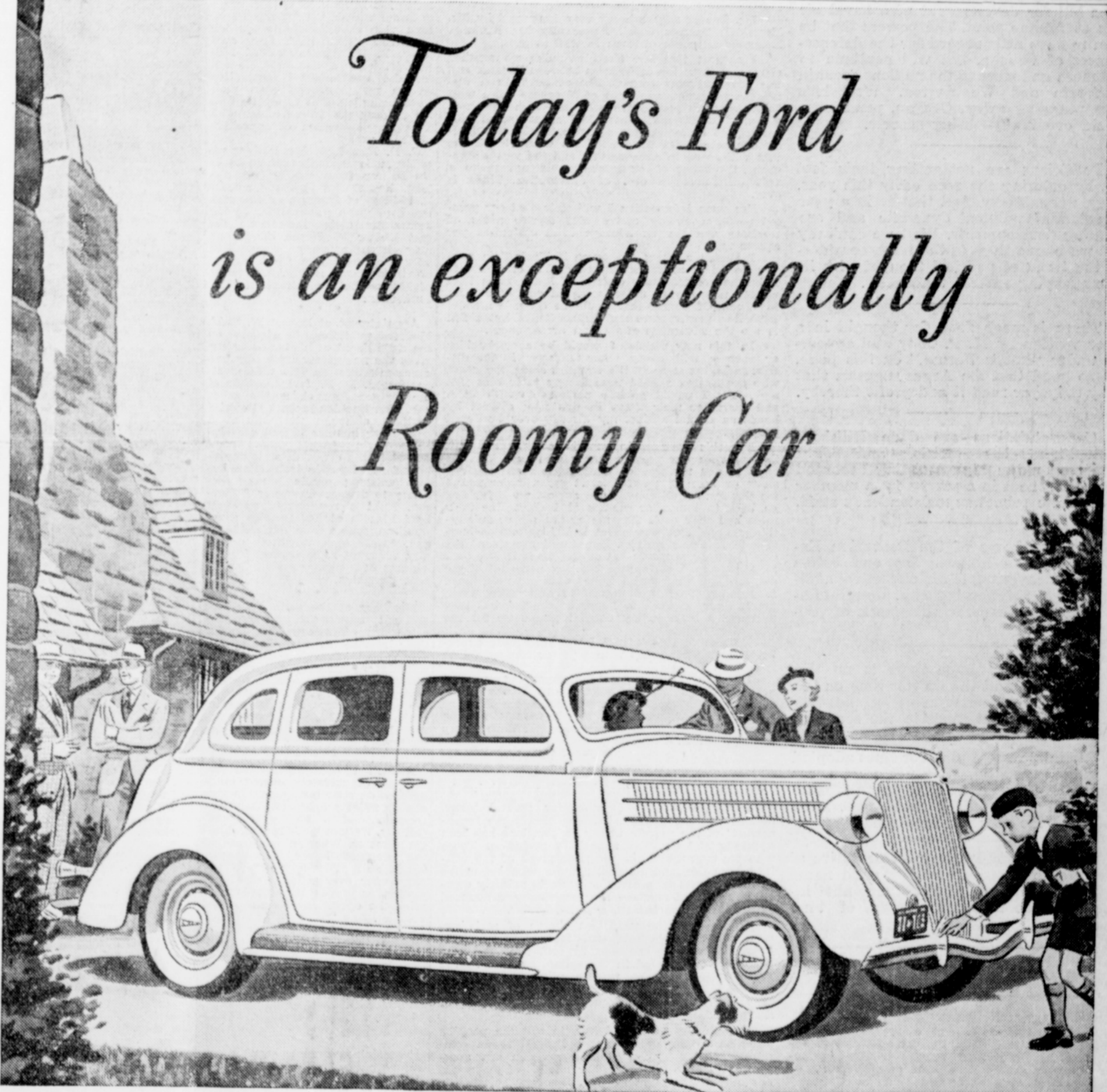
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
