Walnut Trees Hurt
Some walnut trees in this vicinity are damaged to some extent by the untimely freeze last October. The situation of the orchard on the slope of a hill seems to have had some effect. The inner bark on the north side of the tree is turned black and some orchardists think that if the injured bark is cut away the scar may heal and save the tree. Cutting into the limbs of the tree will not disclose any injury which may be there as the sap has started down prior to the freeze, according to some growers. Only trees up to six or seven years of age seem to be injured.

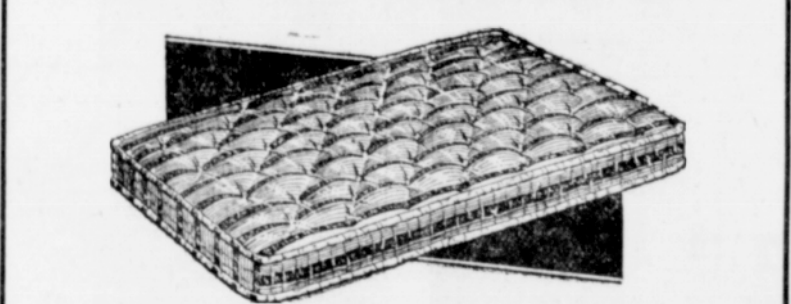

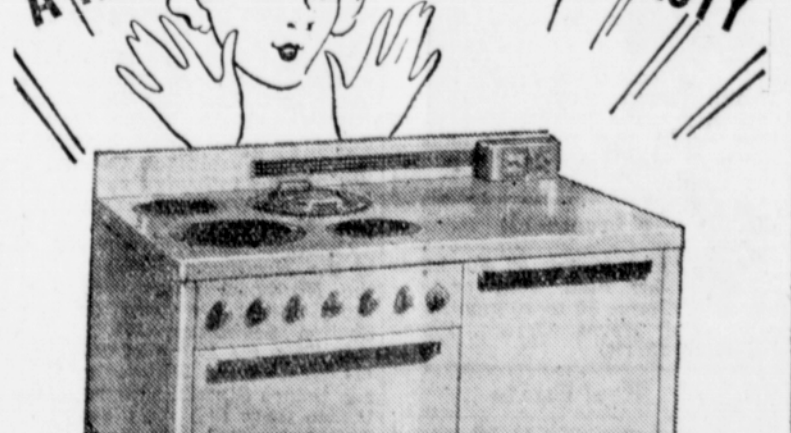
