Church Service Opens National B. P. Week Here

"Religion in Business" will be the topic of Rev. Charles M. Reed's sermon Sunday morning at the Methodist church, to which the Business and Professional Women's club has been invited in observance of National Business Women's Week. This will be the first event of the week's activities, and will be followed by the business meeting and party Monday night at the home of Miss Margaret Cady, with the annual banquet on Friday night, March 20, at the chamber of commerce. An outstanding speaker has been secured and a good musical program is being arranged.

First Business Women's week radio broadcast from the White house will take place on Wednesday, March 18, at 6:30 p. m., eastern standard time (three hours later here, when Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the president, and Miss Charl Ormond Williams, president of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs, will discuss "Women's Responsibility for Effective Democracy." On Monday, March 30, the Honorable Florence P. Kahn, republican congressman from California will discuss the same topic with Miss Williams over NBC hook-up during a portion of the period from 4:30 to 5 p. m., eastern standard time, known as the "Let's Talk It Over Program."

Lively Reading in Library Book List

"Our Times" the United States 1900-1920—the twenties, is one of the interesting books to be found at the library. It is a lively history of the manners and events covering Harding's administration and part of the Coolidge administration. The final chapters give the trend in music, literature, and a chronology of affairs that make newspapers headlines. Fascinating reading, yet giving an accurate and comprehensive picture of the twentieth century, it is crammed with pictures.

Many new books for the young-er readers have been added. "Test Pilot," by Jimmy Collins, will interest the boys. Full of thrills, "Nuvrat the Brave," by Radke Doone, an Eskimo Robinson Crusoe; Boy Scout year book, and stories about dogs. The third and fourth grade readers will enjoy traveling with Madeline Brandeis as they read about children in other lands as fascinating, "Little Jean of France," "Little Tom of England," and "Nitz and Fritz of Germany" have recently been purchased and several more by Madeline Brandeis that have been read and enjoyed.

Following is a book review by a high school student.

"Golden Apples," by Marjorie Kilham Bowings, is a touching story of a boy who, orphaned by his sister while still in childhood, fought his way alone against odds such as the dissolution and death of his sister, until he reached the fulfillment of his dreams of a vast orange grove in the state of a dank Florida jungle. It gives glimpses of the horticulture necessary to raising oranges, and also shows something of the life of the wealthy orange growers, but the story is based on the poverty-stricken inhabitants of the swampy lands of Florida. It is entertaining fiction and portrays vivid pictures of the land and its people.—Velma E. Rosevare.
