

### Rev. Wendling Speaks Tonight

#### Lutheran Lenten Services Held at Union High

The Rev. O. Wendling of Forest Grove will address the Lutherans at the Hilli auditorium this evening at 8 o'clock on the question of the high priest to the Saviour. "What further need have we of witnesses?" Rev. Wendling was called to the Lutheran parish of Forest Grove last August from Gifford, Idaho.

The Rev. George Rouse, local Lutheran pastor, addressed the audience at the passion service last Thursday. Speaking of "True Discipleship" Pastor Rouse stated among other things that a "mark of true discipleship is faith, Peter was a disciple of Jesus and fellow-traveler with him, because he believed on Him. When Jesus asked him, 'Who do you say I am?' he said, 'Blessed art thou Simon Barjona, for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my father in heaven.' It cannot be overestimated that faith in Christ as our only Redeemer is after all the factor of factors in determining whether you are a disciple of 'this man.' You cannot have faith and persistently neglect other requirements, but you may have an outward show of all other requirements and yet have no faith. With faith lacking all other marks of discipleship can give you no satisfactory or positive answer to the question: 'Art not thou also one of this man's disciples?'

The joint Lutheran choir rendered Stone's "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken" and Bach's arrangement of "O Lord who dares to smite thee?" Mrs. Kenneth Biersdorf and Herbert Sahnaw Jr. sang a duet of Charles B. Scott entitled, "Art Thou Weary?"

### A. B. Thomas, Aged Veteran, Succumbs

FOREST GROVE—Arthur B. Thomas, one of the two last members of J. B. Matthews post, G. A. R., died at his home here Thursday. He would have been 88 on March 11.

A member of company L, First Iowa volunteer cavalry, one of the most famous mounted regiments of the Civil war, he served until the company was disbanded on March 16, 1866, nearly a year after Lee's surrender. As a lad of 15 he trudged 25 miles in the coldest January Iowa had ever endured to enlist and then walked back home to get his mother's written consent to join the army. With his regiment he served in Texas nearly a year after the ending of the Civil war. He served in Missouri and Arkansas fighting cutthroats, until, he has said, he could "bushwack better than they could."

In 1880 with Mrs. Thomas, he came to Oregon, settling in Forest Grove. He was in business for some time and finally bought a large orchard, retiring from active management about five years ago. He leaves a son, Horace, editor of the Democrat-Appel, Marysville, Cal., formerly with the Oregonian, and Mrs. Jesse Caples of Winchester Bay.

Funeral services were held here Saturday afternoon. Interment was in Forest View cemetery.

Mr. Thomas conducted an apple house in Hillsboro several years ago.
