Hillsboro Tossers to Hold Meeting

Hillsboro baseball team will hold its first meeting of the year on the new field at 2 o'clock Sunday. All men wishing to try out are asked to bring their equipment as a practice session will be held immediately after the meeting.

All men, who played on Hillsboro's championship team last year, are urged to turn out again this year and endeavor to repeat the showing made last season. After getting off to a slow start last year the team gradually picked up momentum and won eight games out of nine the second half, to end up in a tie for first place with Tualatin. In a playoff game the boys routed Tualatin by an 18 to 3 score and won the right to meet Aloha, first half winners in a three-game series for the championship of the league.

This three game series turned out to be three of the finest games ever played in the Sunset League. Hillsboro got the jump and won the first game 8 to 3 behind the stellar pitching of Ray Brandaw. Aloha won the second game to even the series by a score of 3 to 2 on Jubitz and Ray Brandaw engaged in a pitchers' battle and struck out 27 batters between them. Hillsboro came right back and grabbed the title with a five run rally in the seventh inning after the two teams had stood 2 to 1 in Hillsboro's favor for six innings. Rosky was the winning pitcher and ran his winning record to 12 wins and only one loss which is a brilliant pitching record.

color, the tree is probably all right and it may even be possible that this might show some slight discoloration without the tree being seriously damaged.

Heavy pruning or heavy cutting back of the trees at this time of the year is in the belief that they are seriously damaged and that this type of pruning is necessary, would seem to be a very serious mistake in view of the actual uncertainty as to winter damage. A much better policy to follow would be that of doing no more than the ordinary pruning if any until the actual effect of the cold weather can be more clearly seen.

If a cow has to draw too heavily on her own body stores of mineral, she is more apt to have trouble, such as milk fever, retained afterbirth, and be very slow coming to maximum production.
