David Hagg & Sons, Reedville dairymen, again topped the list of high testing cows in the Washington County Herd Improvement association. Sally 11, grade Jersey, 8 years old, produced 1346 pounds of milk in February averaging 63.5 pounds of fat and the other cows, also a grade Jersey, 7 years old, produced 986 pounds of milk and 77.8 pounds of fat. The Hagg herd also was high in herds of more than 40 cows, averaging 653 pounds of milk and 36.55 of fat.

In herds of more than 20 cows, C. B. Buchanan's purebred and grade Jerseys averaged 779 pounds of milk and 38.62 pounds of fat for the 35 cows. J. W. Mulloy's herd of purebred and grade Guernseys was high in herds from 12

to 20 with an average milk production of 827 pounds and 41.44 pounds of fat.

The L. R. Allen herd of 11 grade Jerseys was high in herds under 12 with 631 pounds of milk average and 34.41 of fat.

The tester detected nine cows which were boarders and which were sold for beef, while eight cows were sold for dairy purposes. Four cows died. Twenty-seven herds were on test in February, with 636 cows enrolled of which 87 were dry. Total milk production was 418,155 pounds of which 18,921.5 was fat. There were 184 cows which were in the 40 pounds of fat class. The association average was 655 pounds of milk and 29.65 of fat.
