J. M. Kotera, new owner of the Crews place, has made some interior improvements in his home.

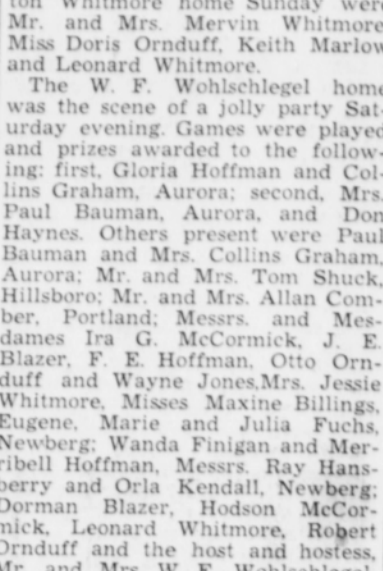
