Hillsboro Sunset Entry Preparing for Season Play

Hillsboro's entry in the Sunset league went through an intensive batting practice Sunday at the grounds were too soft for any fielding workout. Several of the men were hitting exceptionally well for so early in the season and a good batting team is expected to be put on the field. Last year Hillsboro's champions maintained an average of 12 men of .311, which is very high for a season's average. This year's team is out to better that average if possible, but tougher pitching in the league this year may cause a decided slump in batting averages.

A new outfielder, Fred Perdue, was signed last week and was hitting hard. Perdue played in the Oklahoma state league last year, where he made quite a name for himself as a pitcher and outfielder. He bats left-handed, which gives the squad six left-handers and three right-hand batters. Last year Hillsboro had seven left-hand batters that were vulnerable to left-hand pitchers.

Just how good the boys will show up in the field is a matter of guess work, as it has been too soft and wet to get any infield work. Hillsboro's infield will be composed of the following men: Coxy Robinson, Frank Heinrich, Donald Shattuck, Mickey Davis, a youngster who shows good promise, and John Donahoe, who played in the Oregon state league last year. Hillsboro will miss the services of Whitey Matson this year as he is now living in Southern Oregon.

Hillsboro's outfield will be composed of Hanna, Joon, Lyle Oakes and Perdue. Chuck Hoag will be behind the plate with Bill Zeigler in reserve.

Next Sunday the final practice session will be held on the new field and a starting lineup for the opening game April 3 will be selected from the men present. In-field practice will start at 1 o'clock and will be followed by a strenuous batting practice with the pitchers throwing them in. A short practice game will be held later in the day and a meeting of the men signed up will be held after the workout, where plans will be discussed and uniforms issued. All men are asked to be on the new field ready to go at 1 o'clock sharp as a lot of work must be done Sunday and a smooth-working combination must be selected and a batting order worked out.
