New Farm Relief Plan Announced

Washington County Farmers to Receive Pay for Soil Building

Two Plans Included

Agreements Not Necessary to Participate

(By Wm. F. Cyrus, County Agent) Payments of \$10 per acre, possibly more, may be made to Washington county farmers who improve their acreage in 1936 of alfalfa, red clover and grass over the total acreage of these crops in 1935. Such payments will be possible under the provisions of the new soil conservation act which will soon be presented to farmers at a series of community meetings which will be announced later.

Two types of payments are provided in the act. First, payments for increasing the acreage of soil conserving crops; second, for planting soil building crops. This second class of payments will not exceed a total determined by an allowance of one dollar per acre for all the soil building crops new or old that are on the place. However, the payment is made only on a basis of new seedings made during the crop year of 1936, consequently, may not always reach the maximum total for a particular farm.

Offer Two Plans

Payments under the first plan will be made only when not less than 15 per cent of the total acreage of soil depleting crops is changed into soil conserving crops. When the acreage diverted from soil depleting to soil conserving crops is greater than 15 per cent, payments will be made only on the 15 per cent. However, the second type of payment, or soil building payment, could be made on the entire new seeding, providing that the acreage times the rate would not exceed the maximum total permitted for the particular farm as determined by the total acreage of soil conserving crops both new and old.
