

School for Parents in Hillsboro April 9

First annual school for parents in Washington county will be held April 9 in the Hillsboro chamber of commerce rooms, beginning at 10:15 a. m. and continuing throughout the day, according to Blanche Eickworth, home demonstration agent for Washington and Yamhill counties.

Instruction will be given during the morning and afternoon sessions by Maud Mueser Morse, of S. C. extension specialist for parent education and child development, on subjects concerning family life and ways of promoting a happy and harmonious family life.

The morning talk, "Our Family Talks It Over," takes in problems of husbands and wives. The afternoon session, "Dad Belong," refers to the father's right to a place in the family circle. Both discussions will be handled by Mrs. Morse, who is widely known throughout the state because of similar projects in many of the counties in the field of parent education. Mrs. Morse will have with her two exhibits, one being a homemade toy exhibit and the other an exhibit of new books and pamphlets in the field of parent education and child development and related subjects.

The sessions are open to all interested homemakers, and the school for parents is being presented as a part of the extension project in parent education and child development. Out-of-town homemakers will have to make their own luncheon arrangements. The school is of special interest to parents, but is not necessarily confined to mothers and fathers of children, according to Miss Eickworth. Grandparents, aunts and uncles, in fact any member of the family, will find exceedingly interesting points for their consideration. The meetings are free and both men and women are welcome to attend.

Mrs. Thomas R. Roe, secretary of the County Home Extension committee, will preside during the morning session and Mrs. W. P. Rasmussen, member of the county committee, will preside during the afternoon. Mrs. A. C. Ahlgren, song leader of the Cherry Grove extension unit, will lead the singing in the morning and Mrs. Olive Gray, song leader of the Laurel extension unit, will lead the afternoon singing.

Books of special interest to mothers: "Development of Learning in Young Children," by Louisa Wagoner, who is a professor of child development at Mills college.

"Masters of the Child: Equipment for Learning," by the chapter on "Normal Rate of Development" will be of great help to young mothers in knowing what development may be expected at different ages, and how to make the best use of the child's development. "Mastery of Social Relationships," "Mastery of Emotions," "Learning to Talk," "Learning to Sleep," and many more chapters of vital interest in training the young child.

"Big Problems on Little Shoulders," by Carl Renz. This book will help the mother to understand what is on the child's mind, and thus how to deal with "the nose out of joint," or "the ugly duckling," "the bad little good boy," or the case where memory was cause of an ailment.

A splendid, readable book to mothers of the pre-school child is "Amateur Nurse" by Mary Wheeler. It will be of great help in the home. When to call the doctor, what to do before he arrives, and how to carry out the doctor's instructions. It has special chapters on contagious diseases, and how to care for real young patients and older ones. This book is of interest to all women in the home.

"Growth and Development of the Young Child" by Rand, Sweney and Vincent. A very valuable book for expectant mothers or young mothers. Some weeks ago we reviewed "Manners in Business," which will be of great help to all who are employed.

Walkers Return From Extended California Trip

Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Walker returned Friday night from a six weeks' trip to California. They registered more than 4000 miles on their automobile while in California. This was their first trip south and they visited friends and relatives in many different sections, giving them an excellent chance to see most everything that was to be seen.

Business conditions are much better in spite of the kicks heard, according to Walker. He said Roosevelt would carry California through to one unless Dr. F. E. Townsend becomes too big a problem. He attended a Townsend meeting in the Olympic stadium in Los Angeles, where the gates were closed three-quarters of an hour ahead of time set for opening and thousands were turned away.
