Put on your thinking-cap. Figure it out. Do you know the answer? It is something that you get all in one instant. A fool question, you say. Then ask the Bible. Here it is—But now a righteousness of God has come into view. This is that which is called the righteousness of God by faith." So says Bunyan. You stand at the Cross of Christ and look up and see Him dying for you there. You are saying—"I broke the law and earned the curse; He died under it for me. From that instant and forever in God's sight you are clothed upon; dressed in God's eternal righteousness. Take

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God at his word, that the blood of Christ wipes out all the sin-guilt and then there he counts his righteousness over to you. All yours and yet day by day you get more of it. Like this: God now makes it his business to build Jesus Christ into your thoughts, words, deeds. What God sees in you, he wants the home folks to see.
