Alleged Linoleum Bargains Prove Costly Says Bureau

(By Portland Better Business Bureau, Inc.) A "bargain" offered by itinerate linoleum peddlers may prove very costly, if recent complaints to the Portland Better Business Bureau are a criterion.

These complaints indicate that a crew of these transient salespeople are operating in Oregon. Their practice is to call at a home and represent that they have just finished laying new linoleum in a house in the district and have a piece of fine quality inlaid linoleum left which they are willing to sell at a greatly reduced price rather than take it back to the shop.

Like most of these "something-for-nothing" deals, the transaction must be completed immediately, and the complainants report they were rushed into the purchase before they had any opportunity to investigate the representations, or check the value of the floor covering.

One party who made a purchase from this crew reports she paid \$19 for so-called inlaid linoleum, only to find later that the merchandise delivered to her was actually felt base floor covering that could be duplicated in retail stores at a fraction of this price.

Snow Storm Cuts Health Attendance

Small attendance was reported at the meeting of the Washington County Health association held in Beaverton high school Tuesday night. Reports were given by Margaret Dixon, county nurse. Mrs. Zola Morgan, seal sale chairman, and Rose Cave, secretary. Miss Dixon's report shows 2195 skin tests for tuberculosis since the tests were first given to children in August, 1934. During this time 47 adults also were tested. Of the total, eight per cent were found to give positive reactions to the test. Tests have been conducted in 22 schools.

Tests this year will be given to all high school students except Hillsboro, where tests already have been administered. Next fall schools will be supplied with consent slips and wherever a school returns 60 per cent or more of the slips signed by parents, tests will be given.

Mrs. Morgan, in her report, disclosed that the annual seal sale this year was 13 per cent higher than any previous sale. The tuberculosis tests are made possible by the response to the sale, she pointed out.

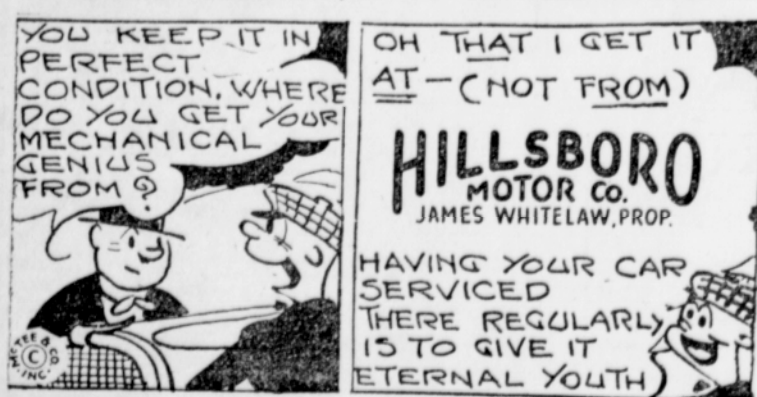
