### Mrs. Agnes Hines Taken by Death

FOREST GROVE—Mrs. Agnes E. Hines, film producer and club woman, died at her home here April 7 of pneumonia. She had been ill a week.

Mrs. Hines produced a number of films of the Northwest, several in color. Her rebuilt "Beautiful Oregon" in color and "Season" with sound, showing beautiful gardens of this vicinity, were products of this vicinity, were produced recently. She was author of several Oregon songs, her "Rose Covered Cottage" running into several thousand copies.

Born in Ashland on September 22, 1872, Mrs. Hines was a member of the graduating class of '89, Ashland Normal school. She was a former secretary of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, an active member of the first Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers and first Oregon organizer for the League of Western Writers.

She was the wife of Dr. Charles Hines and mother of Willis Hines, teacher in the Forest Grove union high school, and Margaret Hines, senior at Pacific university. There is one sister living, Mrs. Miles Cantrell of Ruch, Jackson county.

She taught school for a period at Jacksonville, and later at Midway, near Boston, Mass. Later returning to Jacksonville she met Dr. Charles Hines, a practicing physician. The two were married on October 28, 1896, at Applegate.

tribute to all worthwhile movements. Seventy-five per cent of the total income of the plant, McKinney said, was spent in the community for salaries, labor, taxes, insurance, etc. The 75 per cent spent within the community, 59 per cent is for salaries, labor and news service. In addition to the 75 per cent, another 11 per cent is spent in the state for paper, etc.

Attention also was called to the fact that the Argus is one of two newspapers in the west which have become members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations. This audit, McKinney explained, applies to circulation claims which must be passed and certified by an auditor employed for that purpose, preventing any false claims as to the number of subscribers on the circulation lists of the newspaper.

During the last 13 years, McKinney pointed out, the newspaper news coverage has increased several-fold while the staff in the front office has increased from one to five persons. Thirteen years ago McKinney handled the office while Mrs. McKinney operated the linotype. In addition there are 35 men and women serving in various communities over the county as community reporters. Six are employed in the mechanical department.

McKinney recalled the merger of The Argus and Independent, declaring that The Argus, he felt, had kept faith with those 35 Hillsboro business institutions which signed pledges of support at the time of the merger. He pointed out that S. C. Killen, editor of the Independent for so many years and the other party to the merger, had recently said: "Let me congratulate you and your mother for the fine newspaper you have made the Argus which I believe now to be the kind of a newspaper that Hillsboro deserves."

He closed his talk by pointing with pride to the various honors which have come to The Argus through being named the best weekly newspaper in Oregon in 1930, selection on Casey's all American eleven in 1931, and honorable mention for newspaper production and general excellence in National Editorial association contests in 1934 and 1935.

Following the luncheon, the crowd adjourned to the Argus office, where newspapers were displayed showing the steady improvement in The Argus makeup and size. In the press room, all attending were introduced to the various processes of a printing establishment and given a demonstration of the new Goss press.

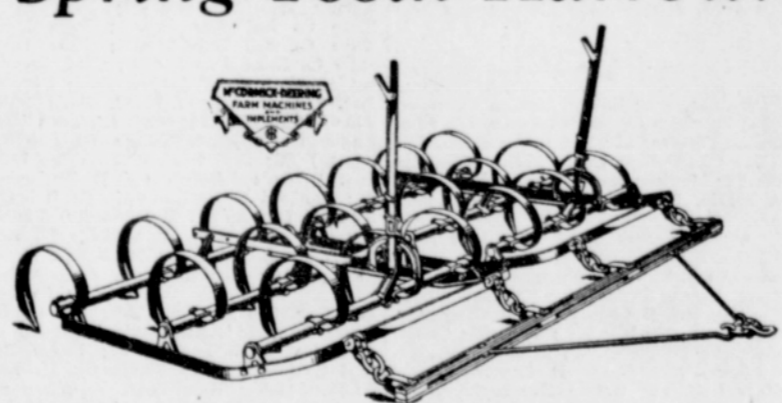
