North Gets Shock in X-ray Accident

Dr. H. D. Huggins of Hillsboro had a small burn on top of his head and slight bruise to remember, as the result of a short circuit caused when his head came near an x-ray machine Tuesday.

The burn was from several thousand volts of electricity, which coursed from his head to his hand when he steadied himself on a metal topped table with his head too near some wiring. The shock threw him backward to the floor.

In describing his experience he relates that at the moment his body made the short circuit, the world seemed to turn to living fire while the next he remembers is when he began picking himself up from the floor.

Although the electricity in an x-ray machine is of extremely high voltage, there is not enough quantity to cause serious damage, it is pointed out. Dr. Huggins remarked that the accident was not painful when it happened.
