### Rabbits Like Camels, Live Without Water

Don't be alarmed this summer if the rabbits you see in the biological survey pen on east Jackson street apparently never are watered, because, somewhere back in their ancestry, the hoppers were crossed with a camel, apparently.

No, there isn't any nature-faking about this at all, and if you don't believe it just ask A. W. Moore, Hillsboro resident and employee of the biological survey. The rabbits are his and he makes a study of them in connection with one of his projects.

These rabbits came from Smith island in Puget Sound and have multiplied since importation until the known population numbers were 20 and no one really knows what may be going on under the surface in the burrows.

Smith island, Moore explains, is about 12 acres in extent and is used for lighthouse purposes. Such shrubbery and grass as grows there is green only in the winter while during the summer the island is as dry as the desert, not even dew falling there at night.

During the long summer months the rabbits have learned to live without water, or even much succulent vegetation, and so, like the camel, have become accustomed to going for long periods of time without a drink.

Sometime in the past, Moore says, tame rabbits were taken to the island and liberated. They may or may not be crossed with wild rabbits but they do resemble the Belgian hares except that they are small and scrawny.

Moore obtained the rabbits when he was called by the government to find some method of reducing the rabbit population on the island after it became apparent that the vegetation, trees and shrubbery would be entirely eaten away unless something was done immediately.

Rabbits are the only animal life on the island, according to Moore. Not even a mouse is found in the buildings.

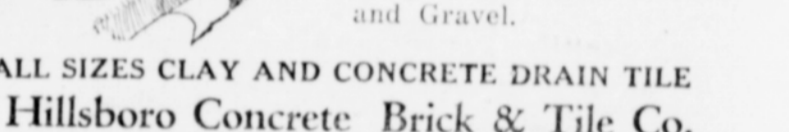
