Mrs. J. L. Green of Garden Home was elected president of the Washington County Parent-Teacher Association council at the final meeting of the school year at Garden Home Tuesday. Riest, Barnhart, secretary, and Mrs. Carl Sande, Forest Grove, treasurer.

Officers were installed by Mrs. William Kletzer, state P.-T. A. president. A past president's pin was presented to Mrs. Knight by Mrs. Paul Patterson, on behalf of the council, in appreciation of her work for two years as council president.

A resolution was unanimously adopted endorsing the county-wide movement against the operation of pin-ball machines, following a discussion of the effects upon young people of petty gambling. Several local units have already endorsed the movement.

Mrs. Kletzer summarized the achievements of the organization for the parent and teacher member for the community, for the state, and for the nation, and showed that the group had accomplished much for health and education during depression years. She said the movement for tuition high schools was stopped, relief secured for closed schools, teachers' wages maintained, shortened terms defeated, free textbooks provided, mothers' pensions obtained, help given handicapped children. All of these were supported by the great P.-T. A. membership.

Mrs. C. W. Walls, first vice-president, spoke on the new national plan for safety. Mrs. Paul Patterson was named to carry out the work in this county after a resolution was passed accepting the program.

A county-wide gain in membership of 13 per cent was announced. Mrs. Courtwright, Mrs. Sande awarded the prize for largest gain since December to the Hillsboro association and the chairman's prize to Mrs. Bronleewe, Garden Home and Shute units won certificates of merit for per cent of school patrons in membership.
