The navy 24-foot whaleboat allotted to the "Rainbow" was re-conditioned previous to the cruise, where it was placed on display, and it was launched the following day at the Portland Yacht club moorage and monthly cruises will now be held. The crew is learning to pull row in preparation for the annual regatta, June 5 and 6.

Book of Verse Published by Mrs. Ida Kays, Now in East

A book of "Common Verse for Common Folk" by Mrs. Ida Kays of Scholls has been published in Minot, N. D. where Mrs. Kays is now living. The books are being sold at Scholls and someone may later sell them here. An article in the Minot Daily News, says in part:

"At 77, Ida Kays, bright-eyed, alert and with a kindly interest in the world and its people, has published a booklet of verse.

"Mrs. Kays has been in Minot with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. George D. Mounce, since last August. Her home is on a wainut ranch at Hillsboro, Ore., where she has lived for 23 years.

"Much of her life has been devoted to teaching. At 15, in Ohio, she began the teaching career which ended in Oregon when she was 71. It had not been continuous, however—once there was a lapse of 20 years between teaching engagements.

"Common Verse for Common Folk" is the title of the collection of Mrs. Kays' writings which has just come from the press. The dedication is to "my dear daughter Florence (Mrs. Mounce), her friends and my friends, especially those who have prompted some of these poems." There is an introduction by Esther Thorsell, Kansas City teacher for many years, who lived for five years in Oregon with Mrs. Kays, and who wrote this tribute on Mrs. Kays' 71st birthday anniversary.

"In frail health, Mrs. Kays has had to remain in bed a great share of the time since coming to Minot.
