### Mahoney Talks to Big Crowd Here

had full production capacity it would be possible to produce 135 billions, therefore, he declared this country through non-creation of wealth, has lost 300 billions of dollars during this depression. Furthermore, he showed from government investigation the average income to the American family should be \$4370 in order to insure a decent standard of living.

Mr. Mahoney declared this showed the trouble was all due to lack of purchasing power in the hands of the people. This he declared is just what the Townsend plan is designed to do and at the same time it will solve the unemployment problem. Furthermore, he declared it is a pay-as-you-go plan that will not only pay for itself but "in eight years would pay off the national debt".

As to the source of revenue for the plan—a business turn-over or transaction tax of 2 percent as embodied in the Townsend plan is sufficient, he declared. To his critics he retorted: "Where did we get the 47 billions to carry on the World war or the 13 billion since raised to pay off war debts?"

Other points commonly raised by critics of the plan were answered in just as direct a way by the speaker. He showed how instead of increasing the tax burden on property it would lessen the burden by doing away with public poor farms and charity institutions and reduce crime and insanity. The plan, he said, will more than pay for itself in the savings in public costs.

This was just one of a series of lectures the Mayor is, without expense to any other than himself, delivering in various communities in the state. Mayor Mahoney has been an ardent advocate of the Townsend plan since its beginning in Oregon. He stands unequivocally for the Townsend plan as embodied in the McGroarty bill and for its soon enactment into law.

old septic tank and into the outfall sewers through which it flows directly into the river. The new sewage mains also have been hooked into the outfall sewer as have the drains being laid to care for surplus water seeping from the big excavation.

As soon as proper drainage has been installed, it is expected that the forms for concrete will be ready for assembling.

According to George McGee, city engineer, the black sands found in the excavation probably are beach sands thrown there from an inland sea or lake. The soil above the sand has the appearance of lake bottom ooze, or river muck.

On the other hand the quicksands encountered on higher ground along the sewer lines, is brown or grey, and runs with the water when pumped from the ditches.
