HOME OWNERS WARNED TO GET ROOFING ESTIMATES IN ADVANCE

(By Portland Better Business Bureau, Inc.) Home owners are warned by the Portland Business Bureau to use caution in authorizing repairs on the roofs of their homes by first ascertaining the estimated cost of such work.

Several instances have been reported to the bureau where a small group of roof repairers are operating in the suburbs and approaching home owners with the statement that they will repair the gutters and spouts at a very low price because they happen to be doing other work in the immediate neighborhood.

According to the complaints, the bureau states, the repairmen not only do the work on the gutters and spouts, but undertake additional unauthorized repair work on the roof itself. Considerable un-
