## Banks High Loses One, Takes Gaston

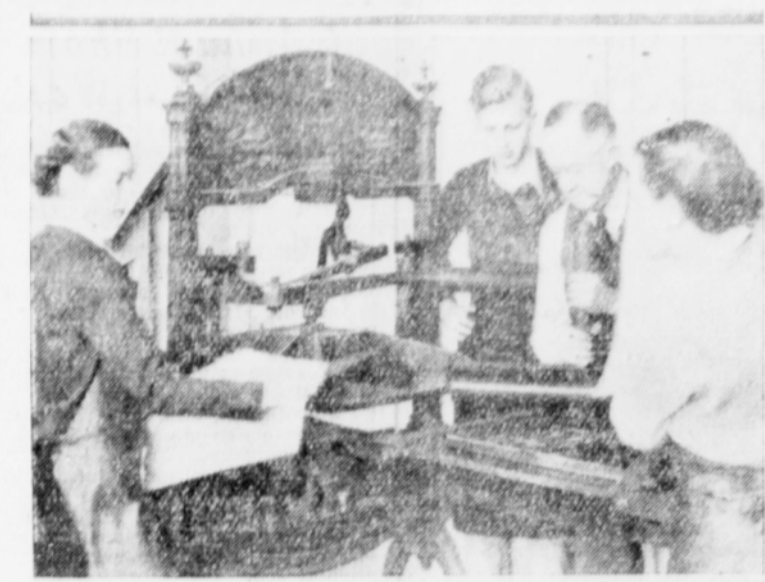
BANKS—Banks high school baseball team played their first game April 14. Banks put up a hard fight against Tigard, but lost in the last inning by one run.

## Portland Men Dispute Law

Declare Soliciting Accounts Without License O. K.

Stipulations of fact were taken in circuit court before Judge R. Frank Peters Tuesday in the case of Mark Davidson and H. L. Bretvold of Portland, indicted last December for soliciting collection accounts without first obtaining a license.

Should Judge Peters rule for the state, the defendants indicated that the case would be appealed to the supreme court to test the constitutionality of the law.

The men testified that they had applied to the state insurance commission for a license to operate and had been denied. On the assumption that they were within their rights, they began operations and were finally arrested at Beaverton by county officers in November.

Edward Epling of Gaston, another of four Gaston youths wanted for burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the alleged theft last winter of a keg of beer from a Gaston restaurant, was arrested Tuesday and plead guilty before Judge Peters. Sentence was postponed.

The other three youths already have been arrested and arraigned. Two, apparently, will be arraigned according to Russell Morgan, district attorney. Epling joined the army two weeks ago.
