

# National Music Week Announced, May 3-9

National Music Week will be observed from May 3 to May 9, inclusive, and Mrs. Walter Denton of Salem, state chairman of Music Week, has again requested Mrs. V. W. Gardner to inaugurate the observance of the week in Hillsboro. Music Week begins annually on the first Sunday in May and is observed in more than 2000 cities and towns in the nation.

All churches, clubs, and service organizations are urged to stress music and have programs to observe the week. The slogan for Music Week this year is "Strengthen Our Musical Resources." Special attention will be given during the week to American music.

"The time has now come," says David Sarnoff, chairman of the National Music Week committee, "for the friends of music to do more than merely keep alive those of our musical assets which have been threatened with extinction by the depression. We must place them on a solid foundation for proper growth and we must promote among the public in each community a full recognition of their value."
