Senator Jack Allen of Pendleton, candidate for the democratic nomination for state treasurer, was in Hillsboro Wednesday meeting old friends and making new ones. He was accompanied by W. H. Trees, prominent Portland democrat. Allen is a native Oregonian, having been born in LaGrande in 1883.

Concerning his candidacy he has the following to say in part: "I believe in the principles of democracy and am 100 per cent for Roosevelt and his administration. If nominated and elected I pledge to the people of the state of Oregon an efficient and economical administration."

"I have served the people of Pendleton as mayor; also the people of the 19th district as state liquor administrator, always endeavoring to fill these offices in a conscientious and efficient manner and on my record I ask your vote and support."

"I favor an adequate old age pension law but have opposed and will always oppose a state sales tax as I believe it to be a tax on poverty. I favor the reduction of property taxes and believe that the state budget should be based on the revenue available rather than on anticipation."

Japanese Council Speaks at Session "The reason so many American people feel that there may be war with Japan," declared Hon. Ken Tsurumi, Imperial Japanese Consul in Portland, at Pilgrimage House Sunday afternoon, "is because they do not understand either Japan or Japanese people. Japanese are not so afraid of trouble with America, because they study the English language, they study American history and American history. They know American psychology."

Consul Tsurumi was the guest of honor at the dedication of Hillsboro Christian Council's two Japanese cherry trees, at the first of what are planned to be annual "Cherry Blossom Festes" for the promotion of Japanese-American friendship. The trees, planted this spring, were the gift to the council of the family of B. Y. Iwasaki. The consul pointed out in his address that all Japanese culture and tradition give the Nipponese the background to be a peace-loving people.

Wesley Ketcham gave the welcome to Japanese-American friends who were present at the ceremony, and Richard Abts, council president, accepted the trees on behalf of the young people's organization after Arthur Iwasaki had made the presentation. Pastor Henry S. Haller, council advisor, spoke briefly on the similarities between Buddhism and Christianity, and the Rev. S. Kawashima, pastor of the Japanese Methodist Episcopal church in Portland, brought "Cherry Blossom Greetings" from the Japanese-Americans in that city. Leonard Peschka, president of the Deltons, and Raymond Lair, president of the Omegas, presided. A resolution requesting the consul to transmit birthday greetings to the Emperor of Japan April 29 on behalf of the council offered by President LuVerne Ambroth, of the Vikings, was adopted unanimously.

After the formal program, Arthur Iwasaki and George Tsugawa unveiled the two trees, which stand in the parking before the House. Pastor Kawashima pronounced the benediction.
