

# "Smoke Eaters" Keep Clean Slate

## Willamette to Come Sunday

### Three Teams Remain in Undeclared Class

Hillsboro "Smoke Eaters" came out on the long end of 3 to 1 score over Sherwood Sunday in the second game of the Eastern Sunset league season. This game was the first on the Sherwood grounds for the season. Rosky, on the mound for the locals whiffed 15 opposing batters. The game marks the second straight win for Manager Bill Joos and his teammates.

Willamette maintained a clean slate by nailing out Newberg in a hard-fought contest, 4 to 3. Aloha also kept in the win column by dropping Garden Home 12 to 7. Aloha batters slugged out 14 hits, one more than the losers. Tualatin boosted its percentage to the 500 mark by slaying Orenco 17 to 1.

Next Sunday's Games Hillsboro will play Willamette here Sunday, bringing two of the three undefeated teams into action against one another. Sherwood goes to Newberg, Aloha to Orenco and Tualatin to Garden Home.

The first three innings of the Hillsboro-Sherwood game were scoreless. Harkins of Sherwood rearing the first eight Hillsboro batters, five of them by the strike-out route. Rosky, Hillsboro, was hit once in the first three innings and struck out five men.

In the fourth, Donahoe doubled, advanced to third on Hoag's infield out, and scored the first run on Rosky's single through Johnson at second. Sherwood rallied with a single by Fleskes, who scored when Westfall drove a single past Hanna in right field. Rosky then retired the next two batters to prevent further scoring in that frame.

The fifth, sixth and seventh innings also were scoreless, being featured by stellar pitching on both sides and brilliant infield work by Shattuck, Davis, Donahoe and Heinrich of the "Smoke Eat-

ers" and Eaton, shortstop for Sherwood.

At the beginning of the eighth inning, with the scores tied, Hillsboro's team began to bear down. Davis first man to bat, hit sharply to right but was out at second when Gaddis made a quick recovery and a nice throw. Shattuck then pounded the next pitch to single. Heinrich was safe on an error and Hanna worked Harkins for a walk, filling the bases.

With one out and the bases full, Joos went in to pinch hit for Perdue. Shattuck slid home for a score as Joos laid down a bunt and beat the throw to first to give Hillsboro the lead.

With the bases still full and one out, Donahoe forced Heinrich out at home on a grounder to the catcher, and Hoag scored Hanna on an error by Sherwood and Rosky struck out, ending the inning with Hillsboro in the lead 3 to 1.

In the eighth inning Rosky struck out three men and pulled himself out of a tight spot in the inning by striking out Eaton when Sherwood had runners on first and second base with two down. Chuck Hoag, the other half of the Hillsboro battery, played a fine game, continually outguessing the opposing batters and making Rosky very effective by calling the right pitch.

Hillsboro faces another tough spot next Sunday when the locals clash with the fast Willamette team. Last year the Hillsboro team defeated Willamette 7 to 4 and 3 to 2, the second game being a very tight pitching game. In 1934, Willamette was champion of the league and has another good team this year. Either Kollermeier or Bud Swope will pitch for Willamette against either Dan Ford or Rosky for Hillsboro.

Ford has not yet been seen in action this year as he was late in getting his arm in shape, but is expected to be ready to start in a week or two. Ford is possessed with good speed, has a fast curve, and fans are promised a surprise when he cuts loose in his first game.

The game Sunday with Willamette is expected to be a crucial one for the locals. Neither team has yet been defeated. Willamette has defeated Garden Home 7 to 5 and Newberg 4 to 3 in a very tight game. So far Hillsboro has a good defensive record, having only one run scored against them

Tigard and St. Helens high schools tied for third place, each with 23 points. Forest Grove was a close fourth with 20 points, while St. Mary's and Hillsboro trailed behind. St. Mary's having won five and Hillsboro 4½ points.

## County Newspaper Folk View Bakery

County newspapermen from Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Beaverton and Sherwood were taken through the Julia Lee Wright bakery and the Edwards Dependable Coffee plant in Portland Friday and were luncheon guests of the Safety organization at noon. The bakery is said to be the newest and most modern in the United States.

The bakery building itself covers half a block, with an inside floor area of 40,000 square feet. All walls are "daylighted" with windows admitting a maximum of light and sunshine to flood the operations. Interior is finished in spotless white throughout, in order to preserve the atmosphere of sanitation and cleanliness, so necessary to a bakery. In the building arrangements are included clean, roomy locker and shower rooms for the use of employees.

The more than \$200,000 worth of bakery equipment is all of the very latest and scientific design. All the improvements known to the bakery industry have been incorporated, making for the maximum in efficient operation.

The Wright bakery is open to visitors every day of the week, except Saturday, from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m., and Manager Crawford will be happy to welcome anyone and show them through the bakery.
