State Director of Rehabilitation Here

Clifford L. Smith, state director of rural rehabilitation, called at the local rehabilitation office Monday afternoon and he and Mrs. Smith were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Madsen in the evening. Madsen is county Rehabilitation supervisor for Washington county and the portion of Multnomah county west of the Willamette river.

Smith spoke encouragingly of the work throughout the state and stated that it was taking a very important part in relieving the situation of many distressed farm families. He also spoke highly of the type of families who were receiving these loans.

A report was published in some papers recently that funds for further rehabilitation in Oregon were exhausted until a new appropriation was made which is expected after July 1. This, however, is not the case as Smith stated that there were sufficient funds on hand to carry on at the present rate until after the new appropriation.
