

Another product is white oats purchased from local farmers and sold to race horse men all over the country. The oats are given a special cleaning before being shipped.

Another source of business, he pointed out, is the purchase from farmers and sale of seed crops. Vetch in the various varieties, are purchased here and shipped to the south where the seed is used for cover crops on cotton and tobaccolands. Much common vetch also is shipped to California where it is used in orchards for cover crop, he said.
