

### Big Townsend Session Held

Western Director Speaker at Portland Meeting

(By R. L. Putnam) The writer was one of at least twenty-five citizens of this community that attended the monster mass meeting of Townsend clubs at the city auditorium in Portland Sunday, the occasion being the visit of Senator Frank Armbuckle, Western Regional director, of Los Angeles.

If there ever was a doubt in the minds of Oregon Townsendsites as to the success of this great humanitarian movement it was wholly dispelled by the senator in his militant address before the nearly capacity audience packed into that civic auditorium.

Perhaps next to Dr. Townsend, the speaker is held in the esteem of western club members and his loyalty to Dr. E. E. Townsend is unexcelled. He declared that in spite of ridicule and persecution and open opposition to him and his movement Dr. Townsend "moves serenely onward" and the Townsend movement moves on as it never has before. Because of his very intimate acquaintance with the doctor he characterized him not only as "second Abraham Lincoln" but the "greatest statesman of America today."

He showed his wonderful leadership when he pictured the doctor presiding over his national board of nine men "as a president with his cabinet."

He brought written greetings bearing a personal message from Dr. Townsend in which the great leader warned the Townsend clubs against the false propaganda designed to destroy the movement by maligning its leaders. However, he did acknowledge that even the publicity given the movement be adverse still it gives to the movement a universal publicity that could not be bought with money. People have been won to the cause that before were indifferent because of the unfair tactics of the Bell investigation committee.

Furthermore, Dr. Townsend revealed in his message that he has two important recommendations to take to the next national convention to be held within a few months at Cleveland, Ohio, instead of Kansas City as previously announced. They are: (1) "that we immediately begin the task of securing a national constitutional amendment to the constitution in favor of the plan by petitioning every legislature in

the U. S." (2) "that we hold a series of at least one thousand Townsend conventions."

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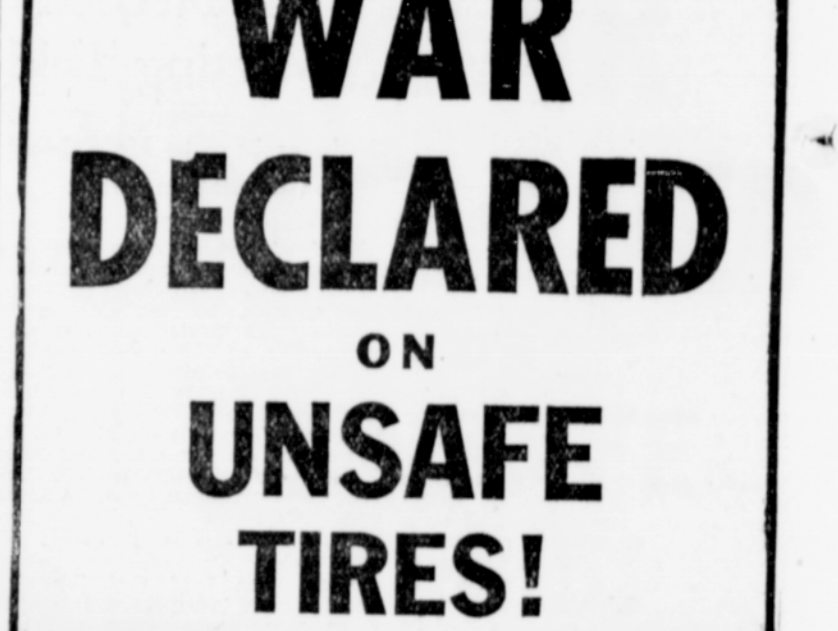
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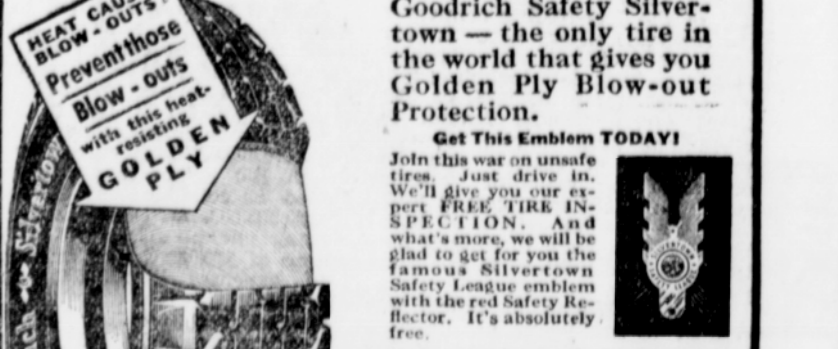
