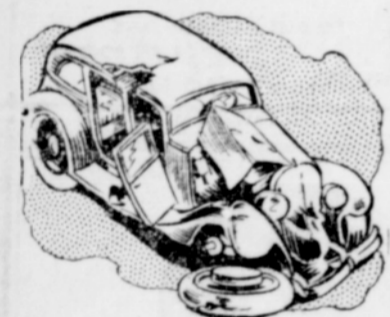

Mrs. Moore Ends 32 Years' Service As P. O. Deputy

Mrs. W. L. Moore, who went out of the postoffice at Banks May 1, had served 32 years or more as the United States postmaster. Her husband, William L. Moore, now mayor of Banks, was appointed postmaster of Greenville during the administration of the late Benjamin Harrison (who became president of the United States in 1889) and served as postmaster for 26 years. In 1896, Mrs. Moore was appointed deputy and served during the most of his tenure in office with the exception of a few years.

The postoffice was moved to Banks in September, 1906, and she states that she was acting postmaster for six weeks, while Mr. Moore had charge of another business during the proprietor's absence. While running the office alone, a number of men came in one day after 5 o'clock from their work on construction of the P. R. & N. Ry. and she had to write money orders for more than \$500 to go out on the morning mail. During the late President Wilson's administration, Mr. Moore was succeeded by J. M. Vanderveiden. Later she served as H. Atlee's deputy for a short time before Arthur Wahl was appointed. During that time she served continuously until May 1, including two months under the present postmaster, H. J. Atlee.

Mrs. Moore, formerly Miss May Pickering, is a native of Bath, England, but came to Oregon when a child. She married W. L. Moore in 1894, and is the mother of two children, Windsor Moore of Portland and Mrs. Alyce Stohler of Banks.

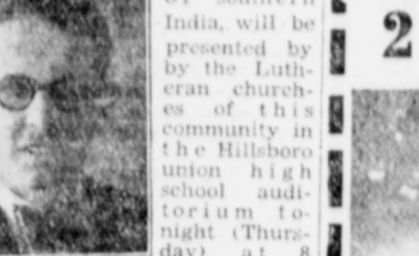
