## Aloha Clash is Forfeited

### Hillsboro Entered in State Tournament June 29

The game at Aloha Sunday was forfeited to Hillsboro in the second inning by Umpire Langdon after an argument had delayed the game longer than the prescribed three minutes. Up to this time the game was a nip and tuck affair with Hillsboro leading 3 to 1. Aloha protested the forfeiture to the league head.

The so-called "brawl" was greatly exaggerated in early reports as no spectators were swinging bats and no bats were swung by the players. Hillsboro players did not engage in the argument except to protest the official of the game from possible bodily harm.

A forfeit game in favor of Hillsboro was sent to the league officials by the umpire in charge of the game, according to the official rules.

Hillsboro and the newly revamped Orengo nine will cross bats here Sunday afternoon at the new athletic park. Sherwood goes to Tualatin, Aloha to Willamette, and Newberg to Garden Home.

Orengo has not yet broken in the win column, but have signed up five new players in order to attempt to stop the Hillsboro winning streak. Last year Orengo beat Hillsboro the first half and Hillsboro defeated Orengo in the second half. Although Hillsboro is favored to win, it was an overconfident Hillsboro team that Orengo defeated last year and since anything can happen in a ball game no predictions as to the outcome are being made. The game will start at 2:30 on the new field.

The Hillsboro team has been officially selected as one of the 16 teams to compete in the state championship baseball tournament, being played at Vaughn street grounds in Portland June 29 to July 18.

 ators widened with the result that operators associated with the Columbia Basin Loggers' group began closing camps.

The strike was first apparent in Washington county at the Consolidated and Vernonia camps and at Deep River, Wash., and involved demands for a closed shop rather than a disagreement over wage adjustments. An agreement allowing an increase of approximately 7 1/2 percent per hour was accepted by both factions.

Closing of the logging operations is expected to have an immediate effect on sawmills with a resulting shutdown there for lack of material. Railway men operating the several logging trains which ply through Washington county also will face layoffs.

When the shutdown is fully effective, approximately 15,000 men
