This service is being provided for the convenience of local residents and all others interested in the outcome of the primary election.

Havens Revokes License as Guilty Plea Entered

Bayard L. Taylor, 54, died May 6 at his home near Reedville, after an illness of almost two years. He had been an invalid since August, 1934.

State Commission Grants Overpass

Permission to construct an overpass at the Garden Home highway crossing the Oregon Electric railway, was granted by the State Utilities commission following a hearing in the county court room in Hillsboro last Thursday. The meeting was attended by representatives of the utilities and state highway commissions.

Because of a protest launched by property owners at both ends of the overpass, a board of viewers was appointed to set a valuation on the state highway. The board by the work. The viewers' report will make their investigation the week of May 18.

A protest and appeal taken from the decision of the viewers in connection with the proposed highway changes at Gales Creek, have been settled out of court, according to members of the county board of commissioners. The contract for construction already has been let by the state. Highway commission and work is expected to commence within the next six weeks.

Veterans Urged to Unite Fronts

D. A. V. Commander Speaks at Joint Legion Meet

Urging a united front in the interests of the disabled veterans of the World War, Commander Gavin of Portland, head of the Disabled American Veterans' organization of Oregon spoke Tuesday night before a joint meeting of Hillsboro and Forest Grove Legion posts.

Another speaker was Carl Moser, state adjutant of the American Legion, who talked on accomplishments of the legion and urged that every effort be made to bring the state membership to a higher percentage among former service men.

Commander Gavin declared that while the Veterans' hospital in Portland had beds for 350 persons, only 10 percent of them were occupied by men with service connected disabilities. He declared that it would be far cheaper for the government to put disabled men on an adequate compensation and charge for use of the hospital.

The public, he declared, is being led to believe that the expense of operating these hospitals is a direct charge against the men disabled in war service.

Moser, in his address, pointed out that the government had, without just cause, wiped out all legislation for the aid of disabled veterans and undone a program which required many years to build. Now, he said, the legion must again make the fight to place the laws back on the statute books.

To lend strength to this work, he strongly urged that posts throughout the state make every effort to get all veterans behind the national legislative program in an attempt to gain back all of the lost ground.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 2 p. m. from Scotch church for Clara Bell Brown, 59, who died in her North Plains home Monday. Burial will be in the North Plains cemetery.

Mrs. Brown was born July 24, 1876, in Gold Hill, Nevada, and had been a resident of Washington county for the last 50 years. She is survived by the widower, F. G. Brown, and one daughter, Mrs. Ada Cutting of Tigard. She was a member of the Grange.

COSTS. Exclusive of a deputy, the need for which was done away with by repeal of the prohibition law, the costs of the office are nearly 50 per cent MORE during the present administration.

FINES. In considering the cost of the office it should be remembered that the FINES taken in have DECREASED from \$37,685.00 to \$13,108.00.
