Plans for Armory Revived by Report

Hillsboro is among the eligible cities in Oregon for an armory constructed by WPA labor on plans submitted last winter from Salem, according to a Washington dispatch stating that a million and a half dollars was available for work.

Responsibility for placing the projects under construction lies entirely with the state department of WPA, the dispatch said, and funds are available for this work.

Afunds are available for this work if the state wishes to go ahead.

However, the report stated, con-struction depends on the amount of skilled labor available in the terri-tory. The Hillsboro building would cost \$25,000 and would house the headquarters company and serve as a community center.




