Several from here attended the funeral Thursday of Mrs. Brown of North Plains, mother of Mrs. Harold Cutting.

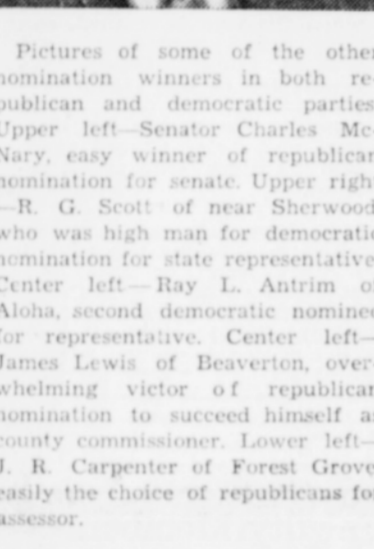
