Tom Bronleeve Jr., student at Oregon State college, spent the week-end with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Bronleeve.

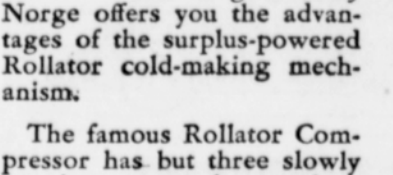
