

Daily Church School Started Here Monday

The two-week daily vacation church school, under the auspices of the Ministerial association of Hillsboro, started Monday morning with an enrollment of thirty-three pupils and six officers and teachers. The school is under the direction of R. L. Putnam, minister of the Christian church, in whose church building the school is convening each week day from 9 to 12 o'clock noon.

Three classes are being offered as follows: For primary (1st, 2nd, 3rd grades) "Learning About Our Church," with Mrs. Putnam, superintendent, and Miss Cook assistant; Intermediate (4th, 5th, 6th grades) "Living In Our Community," with G. P. Duffield, minister Foursquare church, superintendent, and Harry Dornsey, minister Pontee's tabernacle church, assistant; Intermediate (7th and 8th grades), "The Living Church," with Charles Reed, minister of the Methodist church, superintendent and teacher.

According to the director, R. L. Putnam, more pupils and more helpers will be added as the school progresses. During the "project" hour the different groups will visit places of interest in the community and learn about them and their relation to the civic, social, moral and spiritual betterment of the community. The children will return to transcribe their notes and impressions in some concrete manner. Examples of work done by the pupils will be on display for the public at closing exercises June 14.

Fifteen more were enrolled Tuesday morning.

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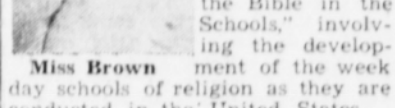
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Miss Brown to Speak in Europe
