Nation honors its war dead. Zioncheck put in jail. Congressman floored by police after riotous scene.

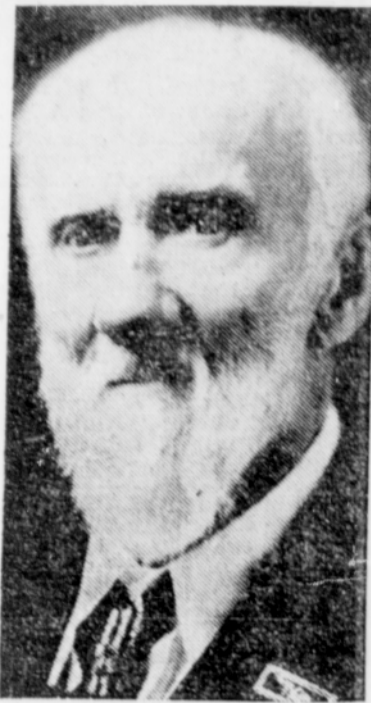
