BEND—Voters in the Tigard union high school district again turned down the request for additional funds to finance the completion of the addition now under construction. The proposed bond issue was for \$6000. Results of the election held May 25 were 180 to 169 against the issue. H. E. Leedy, district clerk, announces. The additional money would have made possible the completion of the addition. A similar bond issue was turned down by the voters last March by a vote of 93 to 86. 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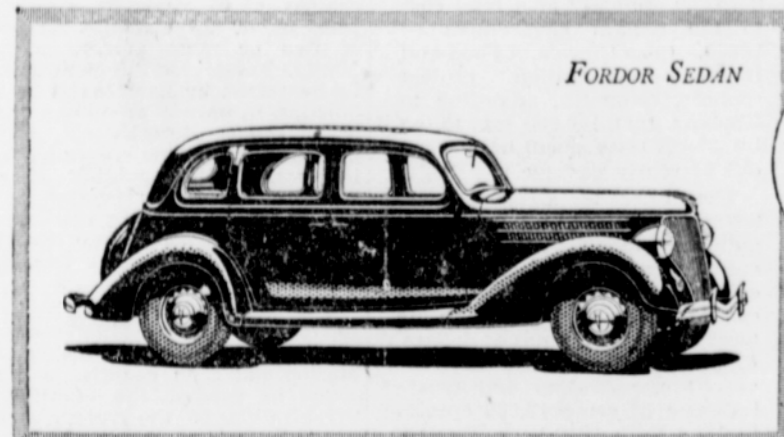
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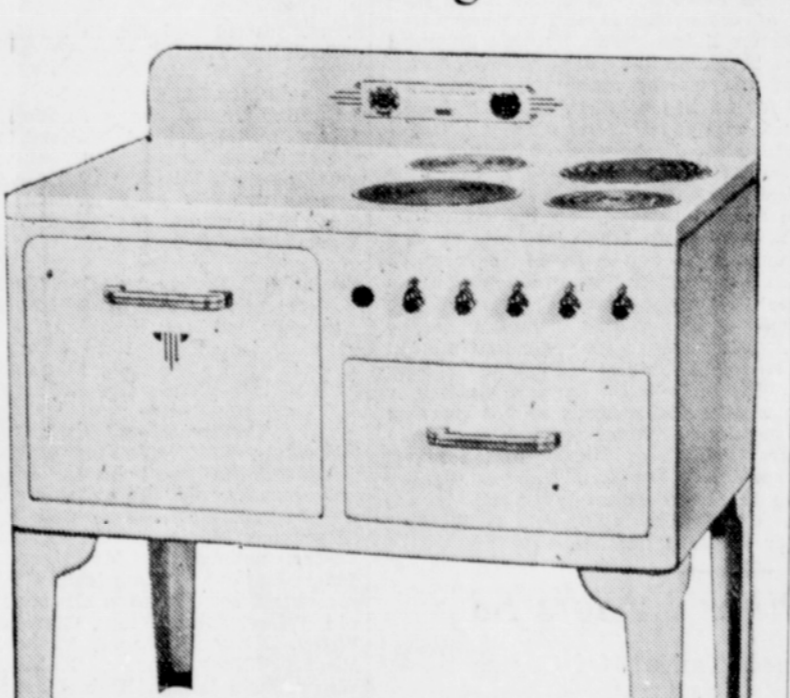
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
